- 12 spice containers with 55 pre-printed spice labels
- each container measures out spices in ¼ teaspoon audible clicks
- measured increments help keep spices in control
- great for low vision cooking
- carousel can double stack or mount under a cabinet

CLVC March item of the month:

Talking Food Cans: Easily Identify Food and Other Household Items

Price: \$25.95

- Record voice descriptions telling contents of cans
- Press button to hear message played back
- Reusable and re-recordable

The product comes in the form of a magnetic yellow cap that sits on top of any sized steel can. The cap allows you to record a short voice message, which can then be played back at any time with the touch of a button. It is very easy to use, and the voice messages can be rerecorded over and over making the product reusable time and time again.

Insider Corner

Action Audio, Making Sports Broadcasts Accessible To People Living With Blindness Or Low Vision.

Action Audio works by turning spatial data provided by Hawk-Eye real time ball monitoring into 3D sound. The system emphasizes ball speed and trajectory, proximity to line and shot type, and augments critical moments to allow blind and low vision audiences to follow the game without seeing the ball. Dot Pad making images touchable for blind and partially sighted users.

Braille readers are generally extremely complex mechanically, relying on hundreds of tiny hinges and gears to raise and lower the pins on demand — and they must also be robust enough to withstand constant pressure from touching.

Dot is trying to change all that with not just better, more capable hardware but also deeper integrations with smartphones and tablets. The other big advantage Dot has is its collaboration with Apple.

Dot has taken a huge step forward with a smart braille device that not only allows for easy display of text, but tactile representations of imagery, potentially opening an entirely new layer for education and accessible content.

Job Announcements

The Winston Salem location has a \$250 referral bonus program for any current employee that refers a blind or visually impaired candidate or sighted/temp candidate to IFB.

Please note the following criteria:

Blind and Visually Impaired EE referral program (Winston Salem) -

- The referred candidate must be hired in a full-time hourly capacity.
- The name of the referring employee must be listed on the candidate's application at the time of completion in the "Referral Source" section no exceptions.
- If more than one employee is listed on the application as the referring employee, the first employee listed will be the one eligible to receive the bonus:

- 250.00 after the associate has completed 90 days continuous full-time employment.
- An additional \$250.00 after 6 months continuous full-time employment.

Temp Referral Program (Winston Salem) -

- The referred candidate must be hired in a full-time hourly capacity and hired through one of our temp agencies. EE's hired from the temp agency to IFB full-time will still qualify as a referral
- The name of the referring employee must be listed on the candidate's application at the time of completion in the "Referral Source" section no exceptions.
- If more than one employee is listed on the application as the referring employee, the first employee listed will be the one eligible to receive the bonus:
- 125.00 after the associate has completed 90 days continuous employment, as a temporary associate working at an IFB location. EE hired from the temp agency to IFB fulltime will still qualify as a referral
- An additional \$125 after 6 months continuous employment with a temporary agency or as an IFB EE if hired.

Referral bonuses will be paid as follows:

- If an IFB employee, payment will occur through direct deposit provided the referring employee is still employed at IFB Solutions on the award date
- If a temporary associate, payment will occur through the temporary agency (with IFB approval/authorization) provided the referring associate is still employed at IFB Solutions on the award date.

Associates at other locations should ask your HR Manager or supervisor for the specific programs available at your location.

Sighted Driver – Winston-Salem

Share your experience with children, youth, and adults as a part time driver for the programs department. Feel like a chauffeur taking adults to social events. Show you care by picking up S.E.E. kids for after school. Help promote Sensitivity to Blindness as you drive the team to training events in outreach locations. Many opportunities wait for the person willing to drive part time because programs make a difference in people's lives. Job candidate must already be an IFB employee.
