Being America's leader is serving as a strong advocate for people who are blind and reducing barriers for the 70 percent of Americans who are blind and looking for work.

For **Dan Kelly**, this means ensuring a robust pipeline of government and commercial contracts. Off the manufacturing floor, he advocates on Capitol Hill for preserving rights to employment and opportunity.

IFB's national reputation as the leading U.S. employer of people who are blind drew **Firoz Pathan** and his family to North Carolina from California. He's involved in IFB's employee clubs and committees and works as a sewing operator.

Lynn Shields and her colleagues at IFB's Community Low Vision Centers are leading efforts to ensure individuals with low vision have access to the tools and resources they need to live more independent lives.

IFB Solutions FY 17 Highlights

Positioned our optical lab for future growth and success

- Grew blind hours in the optical lab by 12% and added a second shift.
- Partnered with Luxexcel as the first lab in the world to utilize 3D ophthalmic printing of specialty lenses to reduce turnaround time and improve profitability.
- Continued our legal defense to ensure people who are blind have equal rights to employment when working on contracts with the Dept. of Veterans Affairs.

Managed our portfolio of textile contracts to maintain jobs and created new product opportunities

- Met increased brown T-shirt production requirements by the Navy customer in Little Rock by shifting other T-shirt colors to Winston-Salem.
- Added new capabilities for seam sealing of waterproof textiles so we could expand Extreme Weather Outer Layer Jacket production to multiple facilities.

Recorded 792,000 blind employment hours across all IFB Solutions facilities.



Celebrated a solid performance year in our Base Supply Center division establishing a foundation for future blind employment opportunities

- Created new partnerships with General Services Administration and Joint Manufacturing and Technology Center at Rock Island Arsenal in Illinois.
 We have a 10-year BPA in place that solidifies our blind employment opportunities into the future.
- Expanded products offering at bscsource.com to more than 450,000 items including additions for technical and Maintenance, Repair and Operations.
- Developed a new procurement funding processing capability that lays a foundation to accept new requisition money allowing for future growth and job opportunities for people who are blind.

Developed new opportunities and pathways for employee career growth

- Continued to grow our Workforce Services division with job opportunities in contact centers across the United States.
- Began partnering with Denny's, one of America's largest full-service family restaurant chains, to manage 50 percent of their call center business with coastto-coast coverage.



Generated \$131.5 million in Sales in FY17.

Continued to expand our community programs and services

- Opened our fourth Community Low Vision Center, which is located in Durham, N.C., and is managed by Low Vision Services Coordinator Lynn Shields.
- Reached all 100 counties in North Carolina with the IFB Mobile Vision Center.

Grew our SEE After School and Summer Camp offerings

- Developed a structured curriculum for the SEE After School program. Our students are meeting 95% of their individual goals!
- Welcomed new Youth Program Coordinator Kim Flanagan.
- Launched SEE Camp Abilities H2O on the shores of Lake Norman just outside Charlotte, N.C.



Established new community partnerships to enhance our programs and services

- Partnered with Winston-Salem State University and Rowan-Cabarrus Community College to host occupational therapy internships at Tracy's Little Red Schoolhouse.
- Offered internships at IFB for students from the Governor Morehead School for the Blind in Raleigh.
- Collaborated with UNC School of the Arts on numerous arts-based projects.

Recorded our most generous year to date with more than \$1.3 million raised for programs and services

- Our Bingo for Bags event in Little Rock and the Tin Cup Classic Golf Tournament in Asheville were huge successes.
- Received donations to enhance the facilities at Tracy's Little Red Schoolhouse.
- Raised more than \$14,000 from IFB employees and our community network for Puerto Rico relief in the wake of Hurricane Maria.


